





Town Council Meeting

Meeting began at 7:00 pm

I. Mayor Charles Elliott called the meeting to order.

II. Councilman Glenn Schagelin led the prayer.

III. Charles Elliott led the Pledge of Allegiance.

IV. Public Comment – no public comment

V. Approval of Minutes

Town Council Meeting – May 8, 2025

Councilman Schagelin motioned to approve, Vice Mayor Puchalski 2nd, all voted in favor.

F. Derelict Properties – Mayor Elliott reported that 7 South St (corner of South and Center) would keep getting reminders. He further reported that grass issues were being monitored and would be addressed. Councilman Joekel inquired if there were any updates on 48 Main Street, there were not.

G. Marina – Vice Mayor Puchalski reported the Marina was doing well, with just a few slip holders stilling owing, noting they had until the middle of the month.

H. Tourism – Councilman Joekel reported there is a micro business marketing grant opening, with a closing in July and she is currently working on writing that. She noted this would not cover the signs being requested by the Art Community but would cover advertising and could be applied to website work if it applied to tourism. Councilman Joekel further commented it was a \$5,000 grant and could be used to advertise events as well, such as an artist event or a town holiday event. It was noted this is a highly competitive grant that would require showing results. Mayor Elliott commented that the Town of Exmore recently received a grant for entertainment. Councilman Joekel noted Exmore was in Northampton County and that was a Northampton County Grant. Mayor Elliott expressed a desire to have a meeting to discuss future plans for Tourism. Councilman Joekel requested this be held after her grant application, and after the carnival, and late July was agreed upon. Discussion was given to the Tourism website and to the move forward to regain both the Town's website and the Tourism site. With the invaluable assistance of Jim Bell this is going forward so that total control creative and content of both sites are in the Town's hand

I. Floodplain Administration/CRS Coordinator/RAFT – In Councilman Bilicki's absence no update was given.

J. Town Beautification – Councilman Joekel had nothing new to report. Town Clerk Springer reported the Town Maintenance Supervisor would be taking a flag inventory and additional flags would be ordered.

K. Safety/Security – Councilman Schagelin reported no new issues have arisen.

L. Historic District – Planning Commission and Historic District liaison Jim Bell was out of town. Town Clerk Springer reported the firm working on our designation will be sending their report to the State Historical Board in September.

M. Streets and Drainage – Councilman Hipple reported progress on the South side ditch citing positive reception from many properties and he goes forward with permission for entry. He noted he has been starting with a phone call and will then progress to an onsite meeting. He further noted the main concern was if it would cost the homeowner, which it will not, and touched on the property with the bridge, which will take hand clearing. In the meanwhile, he has been working to clear a few blockage issues, and Matt Moore from VDOT has been attending to collapse off Church St. Councilman Hipple touched on the possibility of using FEMA money to raise, or elevate, some homes and that this will require a comprehensive town wide resiliency plan. Some discussion was given to the state of FEMA and the push to move much of it to the State level. Councilman Hipple touched on a concern of a crushed drain culvert at Powellton and Paul, hoping that the County will come to look at it. Concern was expressed about the state of all culverts and the desire to camera all the culverts. Council Hipple expressed a desire to have the County come in and camera the North to South ditches, and if they are unable to, having a contractor perform that, or have the Town purchase their own camera. It was noted that the AARP Grant was not awarded to Wachapreague, that the awardees had projects that directly involved and benefited Seniors. Councilman Hipple noted he would be visiting a home on Liberty St this week to observe a drainage concern they have in their back yard.

N. Planning Commission – Councilman Joeckel reported the Commission was hopeful the Planning Commission could wrap up the Comprehensive Plan and schedule a public meeting for input in July of this year.

This is what the Artisans of Wachapreague see as such a terrific opportunity to grow our community.

NEW BIZ:

Dredging Operation- Bradford Bay. I spoke to the Project Manager this weekend as his team is demobilizing. I asked about a few questions, about Depth & Width of the channel between the closest Channel Marker to land (Bayview Ave) and the 3rd

Marker. "What is the width of the dredged channel? What is the depth of the channel at Mean Low Tide." I asked. His response was "The Corps of Engineers has signed off on the project"

I then asked about the previous crew, since I knew from being in the Flounder Tournament, multiple boats were stranded 10 yards from the Channel Marker, due to Low Tide and running aground with only a depth of 2.5 – 3.0 feet. The PM volunteered the following. "Well, that could have been when the previous crew allowed the PVC Pipe to crimp 180' causing the pump to burn out." Yes, the Pump did burn out and the crew waited several weeks for a replacement – from their shop in New Orleans.

After our March Meeting when our residents who are Sport Fisherman and have a business of being a Charter Captain, commented on the shifting sand bars and the lack of attention to the Navigational Buoys, which has since been corrected per the US Coast Guards report.

My request is for the Town of Wachapreague to request from the Army Corp of Engineers the Drawings of the Bradford Bay Channel which will show the expected Depths and the Widths of the Dredged Channel. I request that the Army Corps of Engineers submit the Inspection Report indicating the Bradford Bay Channel is compliant. We must hold this company accountable to safeguard Tourism and Recreation in Wachapreague. Those of you who are new to the Town may not recall that in up to the mid 90's the two marinas had over 80 Charter Captains would fishing charters. Now because of the shifting tides and channels have become to shallow for big boats - If we don't have accountability then the small boat recreational fisherman will find alternative places to fish, eat at the Island House and not stay at the Wachapreague Inn.

Who on Council will work with the Army Corp of Engineers to obtain a satisfactory report that the Channel has been dredged as per the Contract Documents?



Dear Mayor Elliott & Clerk Springer:

I am reaching out in regard to the project I am leading which hopes to create/enhance nearly 40 acres of marsh along the western side of southern Cedar Island. I believe we've met before, but as a reminder I am a coastal geologist at VIMS, and the project to which I refer is summarized in the attached one-pager. I believe this same project may be considered as part of potential resilience planning efforts by the Town.

As an update on our project: permitting is ongoing, but slowed by changes at the Army Corps. It remains uncertain, but we hope to have a clear answer later this summer or in the fall. At the same time, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) has invited us to submit a full proposal for construction, **due in two weeks, on July 16**. We're still working through numbers, but our proposal request will fall in the \$5-10M range, although construction may be phased if funding becomes a constraint.

As part of that proposal we are required to submit letters of support. In past funding rounds we were fortunate to secure such a letter from the Town, signed then by Ms. Spinger's predecessor, Charlie Gible. I wonder if you might be able and willing to do the same for us for this proposal. This is especially important this year as the project will most directly benefit Wachapreague.

I have attached here our two page NFWF pre-proposal (essentially a summary addressing questions from NFWF), the 2022 letter the Town provided, and some draft text derived from that 2022 letter to assist with a new letter.

Cedar Island Resilience Project

The mainland of Virginia's Eastern Shore is protected from the Atlantic Ocean by 13 ever-changing barrier islands. Storms and sea-level rise are causing these islands to erode and migrate quickly towards the mainland. Deterioration of these islands leads to loss of vital dune, marsh, and lagoon habitat, and also decreases their ability to provide protection for mainland assets. Cedar Island, located offshore of Wachapreague, VA, is among the most rapidly declining of these islands, and one that can most benefit from restoration of habitats and improvements to island resilience.

Background & Goals

The movement of barrier islands is an expected and natural process, with waves moving sand towards land as sea level rises.

This movement helps barrier islands keep their heads above water. However, where marsh is absent or narrow behind a portion of an island, it creates a vulnerable area where the island can more easily breach during storms, diminishing the island and leaving the mainland unprotected. The Cedar Island Resilience Project proposes to strengthen and extend the natural marsh behind part of the southern end of the island to prevent breaching, and hopefully slow landward migration despite sea-level rise.

Benefits

In addition to protection of the mainland, this project creates habitat for fish, birds, and other wildlife. By raising the elevation of approx. 40 acres of marsh and shallow submerged land and will allow the barrier island to migrate slower. This project both creates higher marsh habitat that will survive longer into the future as sea level rises and strengthens existing dune and beach habitat, thereby supporting wildlife, such as the salt marsh sparrow—a candidate species for federal listing, for years into the future. Finally, salt marshes also take up carbon, so marsh stabilization provides positive larger-scale climate benefits as well.

Specifications & Timeline

The project is in the application drafting stages with 65% engineering/design plans completed. Ongoing hydrodynamic modeling of the project impacts and benefits are informing the final design stages. Expected Joint Permit Application (JPA) submission is late summer 2024, and it is hoped that construction will begin in 2025, depending on identifying and securing funding.


